The above Table may be put to an interesting special use. It will enable the merely English reader to trace the similarity of certain Hebrew letters, as the well-known cause of errors of transcription. For example, he can perceive how minute is the difference in form between dateth and resh, and so how easily "silenced" might creep in where "uplifted" should have stood, or vice-versa, in 1812 (see note there); and similarly how readily kaph should have usurped the place beth in 1502.

N.B.—The vowel a may be pronounced as a in father; and e as e in there.

Obs. 3. Book I. is prevailingly Jehovistic; Book II., Elohistic; Book III., about equally balanced; Book IV., wholly Jehovistic; and Book V., mainly Jehovistic and Liturgical.
